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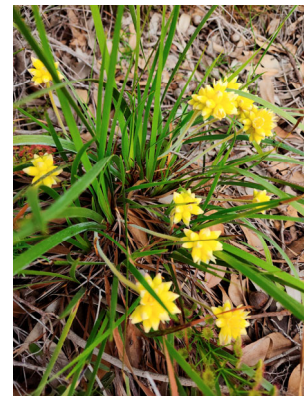

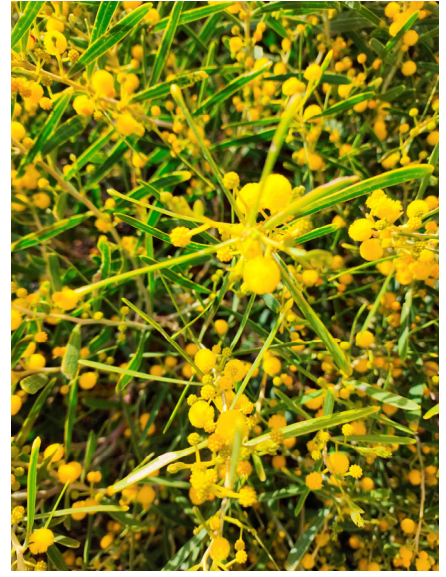

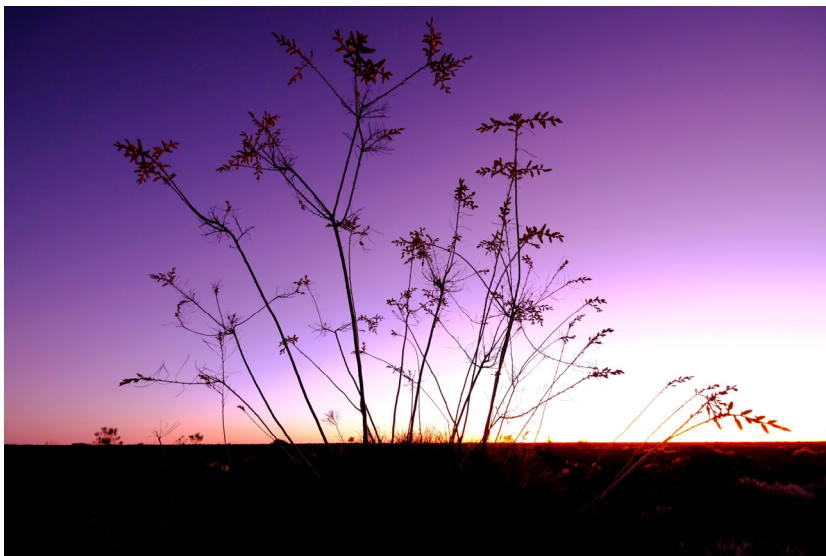

If you're lucky, you might see many reptiles. Including the diminutive thorny devil (*Moloch horridus*) shot in Kalbarri National Park.



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
